DAVIS MUSEUM ANNOUNCES SPRING 2020 EXHIBITION SCHEDULE



WELLESLEY, Mass. – The Davis Museum at Wellesley College will open its spring exhibition season on Thursday evening, February 6, at a special reception for the public from 6:30 to 9 p.m. Visitors will enjoy a first look at new installations that celebrate the work of Wellesley art faculty, the craft and communication power of photography, the secret history of a new Renaissance-era acquisition, and the latest in a series of "Window Invitationals."

All exhibitions are at the Davis Museum on the Wellesley College Campus and are on view February 7 through June 7, 2020. Programs, including the opening reception, are free and open to the public, with no registration required, unless otherwise noted.

Q20: Wellesley Faculty Artists

Q20 celebrates the inventive diversity of practices among professional faculty artists at Wellesley College. The 2020 edition of this quinquennial (every five years) showcase at the Davis Museum features works across media, spanning photography, painting, collage, sculpture, book arts, printmaking, installation, video, sound, and transmedial making. The ten artists included are Jenny O. Johnson, Claudia Joskowicz, Phyllis McGibbon, Kelsey Miller, Elizabeth Mooney, Andrew Mowbray, David Teng Olsen, Daniela Rivera, Katherine Ruffin, and William Van Beckum. Q2 is organized by Lisa Fischman, Ruth Gordon Shapiro '37 Director of the Davis Museum, and Mark Beeman, Manager of Exhibitions and Collections Preparation, with major support from Wellesley College Friends of Art at the Davis and the Erna Bottigheimer Sands (Class of 1929) Art Fund.

Making, Not Taking: Portrait Photography in the 19th Century

Before photographs were taken or snapped, they were *made*. This exhibition recreates the environment of a nineteenth-century portrait studio with selections from the Davis Museum's extensive collection of daguerreotypes, ambrotypes, *cartes de visite*, cabinet cards, and tintypes. The emphasis in the exhibition title on *making* points to the materiality, the craft, and the event of photography in its earliest iterations. Curated by Carrie Cushman, Linda Wyatt Gruber '66 Curatorial Fellow in Photography, the exhibition is supported with funds given through the generosity of Linda Wyatt Gruber (Class of 1966) and Wellesley College Friends of Art at the Davis.

This exhibition of early-twentieth-century American snapshots considers our everyday relationship to photography: the ways in which we mediate, understand, and narrate our lives through the snapping and sharing of photographs, and how and why certain types of images become socially infectious. Mined from the Peter J. Windows Invitational

Alexandria Smith: Seed to Harvest

The Windows Invitational engages artists in transforming the dramatic floor-to-ceiling windows that articulate the lobby and courtyard plaza of the Davis Museum's signature Rafael Moneo building. The third commission in the series is by Alexandria Smith, Head of Painting at the Royal College of Art in London, formerly Assistant Professor of Painting at Wellesley College. Smith's *Seed to Harvest* foregrounds portraits of Wellesley's first African American graduates and borrows its title from the "Patternist" series of novels by Octavia Butler. Curated by Lisa Fischman, Ruth Gordon Shapiro '37 Director, the Windows Invitational is generously supported by Wellesley College Friends of Art at the Davis.
