The Tanner Conference explores the relationship between the liberal arts classroom and student participation in an increasingly diverse and interdependent world. The conference is premised on the belief that a greater understanding of the learning that takes place off campus – combined with critical inquiry into the purpose, value, and effect of such learning – has the potential to move liberal education in new directions.

The Tanner Exhibition provides students the opportunity to learn about Wellesley's international study, internships, Wintersession courses, and fellowships. Faculty, staff, and student representatives from Wellesley's programs will be available to speak with students and share information.

International Study

Every year 250 Wellesley College students attend international study programs in over 40 countries. One-third of those who study internationally participate in Wellesley College sponsored programs, while the remainder attends programs sponsored by other institutions.

Internships

Wellesley College supports a large and diverse number of summer internships and community service projects in the United States and around the world. Each summer, 300 students participate in 38 internship programs in nearly 40 countries.

Wintersession

Each year 100 students participate in international Wintersession programs during the month of January. Wintersession courses have included travel to countries such as: Austria, Belize, Costa Rica, Cuba, France, Haiti, India, Italy, Jamaica, Morocco, and the Republic of Georgia.

Fellowships

Wellesley College offers fellowships for graduate study or research that are open to graduating seniors and Wellesley alumnae. Each year the College supports approximately 30 women in both national and international programs of study or research projects. In addition, faculty committees assist candidates applying for national fellowships like the Rhodes, Marshall, Fulbright, Truman, and Goldwater.



Associated Kyoto Program - Kyoto, Japan

Description: Wellesley College is a member of a consortium of liberal arts colleges that participates in the Associated Kyoto Program at Doshisha University in Kyoto. Courses are taught by professors from participating colleges and by Japanese language teachers. Students live in homestay and take courses in English and Japanese.

Dates: This program follows the Wellesley College academic year (September to May).

Eligibility: One to two years of Japanese language study recommended.

College Year in Athens

Description: This program is designed for students interested in the study of ancient, medieval, or modern Greece and its environs. Courses are offered in archaeology, art history, classical languages and literature, ethnography, history, international relations, modern Greek language and literature, philosophy, political science, and religion. A term or one-year program in Athens; emphasis on ancient Greece with some attention to modern Greece/Greek.

Dates: Fall semester, spring semester, and/or summer.

Eligibility: 3.0 GPA. Admission is on a rolling basis. Students on financial aid will be funded through the generosity of the Phylactopoulos Fund.

Contrasts on the Cape of Good Hope: Introduction to Contemporary South Africa

Description: This is an interdisciplinary, team-taught, intensive course for 14 students from Smith College and Wellesley College (seven from each). It is housed at the University of Cape Town (UCT) and taught primarily by UCT faculty and other academics/experts in the Cape Town area. One Wellesley faculty member attends and is responsible for the evaluation of student work. The course includes a community service component as well as academic work and other activities to engage students in contemporary South African life.

The course includes instruction and practical experience in a variety of fields pertaining to South Africa, ranging from the physical and social sciences to medicine, the arts, politics, and the humanities. Instruction will combine classroom work with field trips and cultural outings. The community service component will focus on issues affecting women and girls in South Africa. The course is primarily based in Cape Town, but there are also trips to Johannesburg and Durban.

Dates: Summer.

Eligibility: Currently enrolled first-years, sophomores, and juniors.

Eastern College Consortium (ECCO) - Bologna, Italy

Description: Semester and year-long courses in Bologna, offering both ECCO courses and the opportunity to follow University of Bologna courses.

Dates: Fall semester, spring semester, or academic year.

Eligibility: Two years of Italian language study.

Ewha Womans University

Description: Wellesley College offers a student-for-student exchange program with Ewha Womans University in Seoul, Korea. Exchange students attend classes at the International Coed Program at Ewha University. All classes (with the exception of Korean) are taught in English.

Dates: Students may attend for one semester or for the academic year.

Eligibility: 2.75 GPA.

Intercollegiate Center for Classical Studies in Rome

Description: This program focuses on the archaeology and topography of ancient Rome and is taught by American faculty. Approximately 35 students are enrolled in the program each semester. Each student takes four credits/classes: a two-unit course on The Ancient City; one unit in Greek or Latin; and one other unit (e.g., art history, Italian language).

Dates: Fall and spring semesters.

Eligibility: Currently registered undergraduates majoring in classics, classical history, or archaeology, or must be art history majors with strong classical interests and background.

Japan Women's University - Tokyo, Japan

Description: Wellesley College offers a student-for-student exchange with Japan Women's University in Tokyo for up to two students per year. Students take courses at the university in addition to intensive Japanese language courses for a total of 30–32 credits, receiving full credit for the year. One academic year course may be taken at Waseda University's International Division (in English) at no additional expense. Students live in homestay.

Dates: To accommodate the difference in academic-year calendars, Wellesley students usually attend during the spring semester of their sophomore year and fall semester of their junior year.

Eligibility: One to two years of Japanese language study recommended.

Programa de Estudios Hispánicos en Córdoba (PRESHCO)

Description: A consortium of Oberlin College, Smith College, The College of Wooster, Trinity College, Wellesley College, and Wheaton College created the Programa de Estudios Hispánicos en Córdoba in 1981 to encourage the intellectual and personal growth that comes from cultural immersion. PRESHCO offers an opportunity to strengthen acquisition of the Spanish language and fosters knowledge and appreciation of Spanish culture through studies in the humanities, social sciences, and fine arts. Academic study in the PRESHCO program is centered around a variety of courses specially developed for students in American colleges and universities and is taught by regular faculty of the University of Córdoba. Course offerings are extensive, featuring both general survey courses on Spain and the European community and specialized offerings on such topics as Roman Andalusia and Semitic Cultures in Al-Andalus. In addition, PRESHCO students may take selected courses in the regular offerings of the Facultad de Filosofía y Letras of the University of Córdoba.

Students are housed in a variety of arrangements, including homestay, privately-run dormitories, and managed apartments. Extensive excursions complement and enhance the program of study.

Dates: Fall semester, spring semester, or academic year.

Eligibility: Wellesley College (or consortium) student, prior course work or knowledge of Spanish, equivalent of five semesters of college work, strong academic record, personal maturity, and interest in the Hispanic world.

St. Peter's College - Oxford University

Description: Wellesley College offers an arrangement with St. Peter's College at Oxford University whereby St. Peter's reserves several spaces each year for Wellesley students. Students are selected by the Wellesley College International Study Committee.

Dates: Late September to late June with long vacations between semesters.

Eligibility: The program is highly selective. A GPA of 3.6 is average.

University of San Andres - Buenos Aires, Argentina

Description: Wellesley College offers a student-for-student exchange program with the Universidad de San Andres in Buenos Aires, Argentina. The university is a small, modern university located in the town of Victoria on the shores of the Rio de la Plata. Classes are normally conducted in Spanish, although professors, staff, and students have an excellent command of English. The Foreign Student Office at the university arranges housing with an Argentine family and organizes trips and programs around Argentina. Students are enrolled in four courses per semester.

Dates: Fall semester runs from the beginning of March to the first week of July; spring semester runs from the beginning of August to the first week of December. Students should arrive two weeks prior to the start of classes for orientation to the University and to Argentina. Students may attend for a semester or a year.

Eligibility: 3.0 GPA.

Wellesley-in-Aix

Description: Wellesley-in-Aix offers an exciting and challenging course of study and an authentic experience of French life and culture. The program is open to women and men alike. Its modest size (30–35 participants) allows for close attention to individual interests and academic needs. Students begin with a pre-session of preparatory course work and cultural excursions in Paris. In Aix, students are fully matriculated at the University of Provence (Aix-Marseille) and take the same courses as French students. Participants are housed with selected families or share studio apartments in the *centre-ville*.

Dates: Academic year program from August to June. Spring semester program from January to June.

Eligibility: Juniors.

Wellesley-in-Vienna

Description: The Department of German sponsors a junior-year abroad program at the University of Vienna. Founded in 1365, the University of Vienna is the oldest university in a German-speaking country and enrolls students in more than 180 departments and programs. The program offers both academic year and spring semester options that allow students of almost any major to pursue their academic interests. An on-site resident director assists students with integration into university life.

The opportunity to participate in internships at various political, cultural, and social institutions is a feature of the program. Internship stipends are made available by the Susan Rappaport Knafel '52 International Internship Fund with application through the Center for Work and Service.

Dates: Academic year program from September to June. Spring semester from January to June.

Eligibility: Open to Wellesley College students. Applicants should have completed at least four semesters of college-level German or its equivalent.

Wellesley's Exchange with the Universities of Lancaster and Manchester (United Kingdom)

Description: Wellesley College offers an academic year and spring semester exchange program in the United Kingdom (U.K.) with the University of Manchester and the University of Lancaster. Two to four places will be available at each institution each year, depending on the number of students from the U.K. who apply to Wellesley.

Dates: The academic-year program is held from September to late June, with long vacations between terms. The spring semester program is held from January to late June. Note: For the University of Lancaster, during the spring semester, students will be attending terms two and three.

Eligibility: Juniors. Applicants in good standing will be selected by lottery but must have a minimum 3.0 GPA.

Center for Work and Service

American Cities Internship Program

Purpose: To promote summer internships that focus on mentorship and the development of leadership skills at for-profit and not-for-profit organizations in major U.S. cities. A key element of the program is the involvement of the Wellesley College Business Leadership Council and local alumnae clubs in sponsoring and mentoring interns. Open to juniors and graduating seniors.

Award: Up to six awards per city. Each award includes a \$3,000 stipend, housing, and airfare.

CWS Summer Stipend Program

The Center for Work and Service (CWS) Summer Stipend Program offers stipends through the 18 different sources listed below. The program funds internships of 350 hours or more and is open primarily to first years, sophomores, and juniors. Seniors are eligible for the Barbara Bush and Oprah Winfrey awards only. Information meetings are held in late November, early December, and January. Priority is given to students who state financial need, have not previously received a stipend, and are working in an unpaid position. Award decisions are merit-based and committees are not required to disburse all available funds.

Carolyn Shaw Bell Internship

Purpose: To encourage and support sophomores and juniors seeking internship experience in business or economics. This program provides stipends for internships in not-for-profit or for-profit organizations.

Award: Up to five awards of \$4,000 each.

Barbara Bush Award for Volunteerism

Purpose: To fund a student pursuing a volunteer experience in disability services, or with the elderly or young children. The placement must be with a not-for-profit organization.

Award: Up to two awards of \$3,000 each, with a gift presented to the recipients.

Blessing Way Summer Public Service Fellowship

Purpose: To support a Wellesley College student committed to making a difference in her community. The fellowship will support a student who is interested in summer work with a not-for-profit or public organization and in building a long-term commitment to service.

Award: Up to one \$3,500 award.

Class of 1962 Student Internship Fund

Purpose: To provide a stipend for a student pursuing a summer internship with a woman in national government.

Award: Up to one \$3,000 award.

Class of 1969 Community Service Internship Fund

Purpose: To provide a summer stipend that supports student involvement in community service and to encourage community service as a lifelong activity for Wellesley College women. Placement must be with a not-for-profit community organization.

Award: Up to one \$3,500 award.

Margaret C. Gordon Law and Education Public Service Award

Purpose: To support a Wellesley College student committed to serving disadvantaged communities through an unpaid summer internship in public interest law and/or an urban public school reform or support program. The stipend will enable a student to take an unpaid internship in order to learn more about the legal and educational issues surrounding disadvantaged urban communities.

Award: Up to one \$3,000 award.

Susan Todd Horton 1910 Internship Fund

Purpose: To support Wellesley College students interested in seeking summer internship experience in not-for-profit and for-profit organizations. This program provides stipends for any internship that is unpaid, full-time, and meets the interests of the applicant.

Award: Up to five awards of \$3,000 each.

Susan Rappaport Knafel '52 International Internship Program

Purpose: To encourage and support Wellesley students pursuing international internship opportunities. This program provides stipends for summer internships in for-profit and not-for-profit organizations.

Award: Up to four awards of \$3,000 each. Additional funds are available to cover airfare, transportation, and housing.

The Mollie Green Lumpkin '25 Fund for Experiential Learning in Latin America

Purpose: To encourage and support Wellesley students seeking summer internships in Spanish-speaking countries. Preference will be given to those students interested in working in the area of environmental protection and preservation.

Award: Up to three awards of \$3,000 each.

The Lumpkin Family Internships for the Environment

Purpose: To encourage and support Wellesley students seeking summer internship experience in not-for-profit organizations dedicated to preserving and protecting the environment.

Award: Up to five awards of \$3,000 each.

The Emily Cohen MacFarquhar '59 Internship for International Journalism

Purpose: To encourage and support Wellesley College students who demonstrate serious interest in journalism through significant work on *The Wellesley News* or other appropriate campus journalistic enterprises, including photojournalism. This stipend will provide the recipients with the opportunity to learn about a foreign culture through work at an international news organization, or through travel and documentation of a culture that is entirely new to them. (This internship does not apply to creative writing.) The fund supports “prospective journalists” from Wellesley to work, study, and travel during the summer months in a country outside the U.S. with which they have no prior connection.

Award: Up to two awards of \$3,000 each. Additional funds to cover airfare and housing.

O'Meara Student Internship Fund

Purpose: To support a Wellesley College student committed to making a difference in her state and/or local community. This internship supports a student who is interested in learning more about state and local government by working directly with a woman involved in any aspect of state or local government in the United States. The stipend enables the student to take an unpaid internship and learn more about state/local governments and the important role that women play in the governmental process.

Award: Up to one \$3,000 award.

Parents' Internship Program (PIP)

Purpose: To provide funding for unpaid summer career development internships. The placements may be with either not-for-profit or for-profit organizations and should focus on the career development and exploration of the applicants. Emphasis is placed on first-time experiences within an industry and/or organization.

Award: Up to ten awards of \$3,000 each.

The Barbara Scott Preiskel '45 Endowed Fund for Internships

Purpose: To encourage and support a student seeking an internship experience to develop her career goals. This program provides a stipend for any internship that is unpaid, full-time, and meets the career interests of the applicant. The internship may be with a not-for-profit, for-profit or public sector organization in the United States.

Award: Up to one \$3,500 award.

Public Service Internship Fund (PSI)

Purpose: To encourage and enable Wellesley students to use their talents and skills in public service. PSI funds students each summer to perform full-time jobs for not-for-profit organizations that could not otherwise employ them. Priority will be given to applicants whose work relates to young children and their families, particularly those who are economically or otherwise disadvantaged.

Award: Up to two awards of \$3,000 each.

Service Opportunity Stipend (SOS)

Purpose: To fund summer placements that offer direct student involvement in front-line public and community service and to foster the spirit of volunteerism. Must be with a not-for-profit organization. Strictly for the pursuit of an experience that involves a particular community/population/issue due to personal interest or concern. Does not support career development exploration. Priority is given to applicants pursuing a full-time community service experience for the first time.

Note: One stipend is designated for a Wellesley College student working at the Low Vision Information Center in Bethesda, Maryland. The Low Vision Information Center is a small, not-for-profit agency that provides information, referrals, and direct service to adults with low vision. Staff members demonstrate to clients how to use light, contrast, labeling systems, magnification, and other devices to enhance independence.

Award: Up to 100 awards of \$3,000 each.

Beth K. Smith Award

Purpose: To provide students with the opportunity to experience public service work in organizations in the not-for-profit sector. The award covers many fields, as long as the

organization is not-for-profit. The types of responsibilities may vary within the organization. The focus is to promote student experiences in the not-for-profits with the hope that students will continue in this field.

Award: Up to five awards of \$3,000 each, with two specifically designated for placements with Social Accountability International in New York City. Minorities are strongly encouraged to apply for the placements at Social Accountability International.

The Wellesley News Internship for Journalism or Publishing

Purpose: To fund a Wellesley College student who has demonstrated interest in the fields of journalism or publishing through significant involvement on *The Wellesley News* or other on-campus or off-campus publications.

Award: Up to one award of \$3,000.

Oprah Winfrey Award for Volunteerism

Purpose: To provide a summer stipend for a student wishing to explore a volunteer position with a not-for-profit social service organization. The award honors the important connection between Oprah Winfrey's speech at the Commencement of the Class of 1997 and the College's motto: *Not to be ministered unto, but to minister*. This award will enable a student each year to follow Ms. Winfrey's example of service.

Award: Up to one award of \$3,000.

Wellesley College International Grant Program

Purpose: The Wellesley College International Grant Program has been established to support Wellesley's mission of educating women who will make a difference in the world. The grant seeks to recognize the contribution that international not-for-profit

organizations have made to Wellesley in providing significant off-campus learning experiences for Wellesley students and alumnae. The purpose of the grant is to provide funding to organizations with demonstrated need that have hosted Wellesley students or alumnae for internships or other learning experiences outside of the U.S.

Award: Up to five awards. The program will distribute a total of \$10,000 per year.

Department of Political Science

Washington Summer Internship Program

Purpose: To provide an opportunity for students to learn about politics and public policy through placements in government offices, public interest groups, media organizations, research, and cultural organizations in Washington, D.C. Twenty interns are selected without regard to a student's major; only juniors are eligible. The program runs for ten weeks. In addition to the internship placement, the program involves weekly seminars and a mentor program with the Wellesley Club of Washington. The Department of Political Science has run this program since 1943.

Award: Twenty stipends of \$1,500 each. The program also pays for housing in the dormitories of George Washington University. An additional stipend in the range of \$300 to \$700 is available for financial aid students.

Summer Internships in Asia

Purpose: To support internships in Asia that give students an opportunity to intensively engage with important local, national, or regional issues. Africana Studies 300: Heritage and Culture in Jamaica

The first half of the course is based on an island bordering the world's second longest barrier reef; living and laboratory facilities for the second half are in an intact lowland rainforest. Course work is primarily out-of-doors, and includes introduction to flora and fauna, lectures, and field tests of student-generated hypotheses.

Music 214: Experiencing the Music, Dance, and Culture of Haiti

Description: During Wintersession, students will have the opportunity to study the music, dance, and culture of Haiti on location by participating in lectures, discussions, and site visits in Port-au-Prince, Gonaives, Jacmel, Lascahobas, Saut d'Eau, Belladère (possibly Elias Piñas, in the Dominican Republic just across the border from Belladère), and Mirebalais where the "Leocardie and Alexandre Kenscoff Cultural Center" or C-CLAK is located. Students will

live at the C-CLAK, a center devoted to socio-cultural development and cultural exchange, which is being built by Professor Fleurant and his wife Florienne. Students will have the opportunity to work with Haitian master drummers and professional dance teachers of folk and ritual music. Students interested in examining other aspects of Haitian life (Creole culture, literature, or religion) may do so with faculty guidance. Interested students are invited to volunteer at C-CLAK by teaching English lessons, computer tutorials, music lessons, singing sessions with the children of the Center's kindergarten, and even helping to paint some sections of the building that houses the C-CLAK. Appropriate readings and a short paper on a practical topic are expected.

French 228: Wintersession in Paris

Description: Three weeks of study and cultural discovery in Paris during Wintersession. Purpose: For a full year of travel or study outside the U.S. Any scholarly, artistic, or cultural purpose may be considered. Candidates must be at least 25 years of age in the year of application. The application and supporting material are due by early December.

Sarah Perry Wood Medical Fellowship

Purpose: For the study of medicine.

Award: Up to \$66,000

Fanny Bullock Workman Fellowship

Purpose: For graduate study in any field.

Wellesley-Yenching Graduate Fellowship at Chung Chi College in Hong Kong

Wellesley-Yenching Graduate Fellowship at Ginling College in Nanjing, China

Purpose: To provide Ginling College with Wellesley graduates who will teach English in the classroom. A full teaching load requires 12 to 14 hours each week with office hours three to four times a week.

Award: Annual stipend of \$6,500 and additional monthly stipend from Ginling College of 1,500 yuan. Housing, international health insurance and evacuation insurance, medical care, round-trip travel, and training in English as a Second Language are also provided.

Wellesley-Yenching Graduate Fellowship at the National Palace Museum in Taipei, Taiwan

Purpose: To provide the National Palace Museum with a Wellesley graduate who has strong English and Mandarin language skills. Approximately one-half of the fellow's work will be with the Museum Secretariat where she will write, translate, and revise English documents for various departments. The other half of the fellow's work will be with one of the museum's other departments.

Award: Annual stipend of \$6,500 and additional monthly stipend from the Museum of NT \$16,500. Health insurance, evacuation insurance, medical care, and round-trip travel are also provided.

For Women Who Are Graduates of Any American Institution

(If you are not a Wellesley College alumna, these are the only two awards for which you may apply.)

Mary McEwen Schimke Scholarship

Purpose: A supplemental award to provide relief from household and child-care expenses while pursuing graduate study. The award is made on the basis of scholarly expectation and identified need. The candidate must be over 30 years of age, currently engaged in graduate study in literature and/or history. Preference given to American Studies majors.

Award: Up to \$1,500

M.A. Cartland Shackford Medical Fellowship

Purpose: For the study of medicine with a view to general practice, not psychiatry.

Award: Minimum of \$9,000
