The Tanner Conference explores the relationship between the liberal arts classroom and student participation in an increasingly diverse and interdependent world. The conference is premised on the belief that a greater understanding of the learning that takes place off campus – combined with critical inquiry into the purpose, value, and effect of such learning – has the potential to take liberal education in new directions. The Tanner Exhibition provides students the opportunity to learn about Wellesley’s internships and service learning, international study, and Wintersession courses. Faculty, staff, and student representatives from Wellesley’s programs will be available to speak with students and share information.

Internships and Service Learning

Wellesley College supports a large and diverse number of summer internships and community service projects in the United States and around the world. Last summer, over 250 students participated in 28 internship programs in 39 countries and throughout the United States.

International Study

Every year approximately 250 Wellesley College students attend international study programs in over 40 countries. One-third of the students who study internationally participates in Wellesley College sponsored programs, while the remainder attends programs sponsored by other institutions.

Wintersession

Over 95 students participated in international Wintersession programs in January 2001, traveling to 11 countries: Austria, Belize, Costa Rica, Cuba, France, Haiti, India, Italy, Jamaica, Morocco, and the Republic of Georgia.



Associated Kyoto Program

Description: Wellesley College is a member of a consortium of liberal arts colleges that participates in the Associated Kyoto Program at the Doshisha University in Kyoto. Courses are taught by professors from participating colleges and by Japanese language teachers. Students live in homestay and take English and Japanese.

Date: This program follows the Wellesley College academic year (September to May).

Application procedure: Applications are available in the Department of Japanese.

Eligibility: Study of the Japanese language for one to two years is recommended.

Cost: Wellesley College financial aid transfers to this program.

College Year in Athens

Description: This program is designed for students interested in the study of ancient, medieval, or modern Greece and its environs. Courses are offered in Archaeology, Art History, Classical Languages and Literature, Ethnography, History, International Relations, Modern Greek Language and Literature, Philosophy, Political Science, and Religion. One-term or one-year program in Athens; emphasis on ancient Greece but with some attention to modern Greece/Greek.

Date: Fall semester, spring semester, and/or summer.

Application procedure: Admission is on a rolling basis.

Eligibility: Student must have a 3.0 GPA.

Cost: In 2000–01, tuition and room and board was \$10,500. This did not include round-trip travel, medical insurance, additional meals, or personal expenses (estimated at \$100–\$150 per week). Students on financial aid will be funded through the generosity of the Phylactopoulos Fund.

Contrasts on the Cape of Good Hope: Introduction to Contemporary South Africa

Description: This is an interdisciplinary, team-taught, intensive course for 14 students from Smith College and Wellesley College (seven from each college). It is housed at the University of Cape Town (UCT) and taught primarily by UCT faculty and other academics/experts in the Cape Town area. One Wellesley faculty member attends and is responsible for the evaluation of student work. The course includes a community service component as well as academic work and other activities to engage students in contemporary South African life.

The course includes instruction and practical experience in a variety of fields pertaining to South Africa, ranging from the physical and social sciences to medicine, the arts, politics, and the humanities. Instruction will combine classroom work with field trips (e.g., Robben Island, the Cape of Good Hope, botanical or zoological field study, and sociological tours of the Cape Town area) and cultural outings (e.g., theater, concerts, and museums). The community service component will focus on issues affecting women and girls in South Africa. The course will begin with a short visit to Gauteng Province which will include visits to sites in Johannesburg and Soweto before traveling to Cape Town for the program.

Date: The program runs from approximately July 25–August 25, 2002.

Application procedure: Application information will be available in early spring 2002. For specific application procedures and deadlines contact Kyle Kauffman, Department of Economics, x2153.

Eligibility: Currently enrolled first years, sophomores, and juniors.

Stipend: Financial aid will be available based on need.

Cost: \$4,000.

ECCO (Eastern College Consortium) - Bologna, Italy

Description: Semester and year-long courses in Bologna, offering both ECCO courses and the opportunity to follow University of Bologna courses.

Date: Fall semester, spring semester, or the entire academic year.

Application procedure: Application deadline for the spring 2002 semester is Tuesday, October 30, 2001. Application deadline for the 2002–03 academic-year program is Friday, March 1, 2002. Deadline for the fall 2002 semester is Friday, March 1, 2002.

Eligibility: Preferably two years of Italian; in exceptional cases, one.

Cost: The cost of the 2001–02 program is \$31,000. Wellesley College financial aid transfers to this program.

Ewha Womans University

Description: Wellesley College has a student-for-student exchange program with Ewha Womans University in Seoul, Korea. Exchange students attend classes at the International Coed Program at Ewha University and all classes (with the exception of Korean) are taught in English.

Date: Students may attend for one semester or for the full year.

Application procedure: The deadline is mid-December for the fall semester of the following year. October 15 is the deadline for the spring semester of the current academic year.

Cost: Wellesley students will pay Wellesley for tuition and all college fees. Students will be billed by Ewha for room and board. Wellesley financial aid packages will be adjusted to cover the cost of the work-study portion of the Wellesley grant. Round-trip transportation costs are not included in the financial aid package and must be arranged by the student.

Hokkaido International Program

Description: Hokkaido International is an intensive summer program in Japanese language study, which includes a homestay and cultural activities.

Date: Summer 2002.

Application procedure: Applications are available in the Department of Japanese, Pendleton West.

Eligibility: Study of the Japanese language for one to two years is recommended.

Cost: The estimated cost for the program in summer 2002 is \$3,940.

Intercollegiate Center for Classical Studies in Rome

Description: This program focuses on the archaeology and topography of ancient Rome and is taught by American faculty. Approximately 35 students are enrolled in the program at a time. Each student takes four credits/classes: a two-unit course on The Ancient City; one unit in Greek or Latin; and one other unit (e.g., Art, Italian).

Date: One-term program, with the same program offered in the fall and spring semesters.

Application procedure: Application deadlines are usually March 15 for the following fall semester and October 15 for the following spring semester.

Cost: Approximately \$14,190 in fixed fees, with variable expenses for passport, books, transportation, and miscellaneous. Wellesley College financial aid transfers to this program.

Japan Women's University - Tokyo, Japan

Description: The exchange program with Japan Women's University runs from January through December, following the Japanese academic year. This is a student-for-student exchange with Japan Women's University in

Tokyo for up to two students per year from both institutions. Students live in homestay and take courses with students at the university as well as intensive language courses. Students take a total of 30–32 credits worth of work to receive full credit for the year. One full-year course may be taken at Waseda University's International Division (in English) at no additional expense.

Date: To accommodate the difference in academic-year calendars, Wellesley students usually attend during the spring semester of their sophomore year and fall semester of their junior year.

Application procedure: Applications are available from the Department of Japanese and the deadline is early in September. All Wellesley students planning to attend this program must file a Study Away Proposal Form, a Course of Study Form, and a Leave of Absence Form with the International Studies Office according to their deadlines.

Cost: Wellesley students will pay fees to Wellesley College and are responsible for their own travel expenses. If there is a difference in the total amount of tuition and living expenses, students will be given a stipend if appropriate. Stipend information is available from the Department of Japanese. Wellesley College financial aid transfers to this program.

Kanazawa Program

Description: This summer program, administered by Princeton University, is located in Kanazawa off the Sea of Japan. The program offers intensive Japanese and homestay.

Date: June 2–July 28, 2002.

Application procedure: Applications are available in the Department of Japanese.

Eligibility: Study of Japanese for one to two years is recommended.

Cost: The cost of the program is estimated at \$3,900 for summer 2002.

PRESHCO (Programa de Estudios Hispánicos en Córdoba)

Description: A consortium of Oberlin College, Smith College, The College of Wooster, Trinity College, Wellesley College, and Wheaton College created the Programa de Estudios Hispánicos en Córdoba in 1981 in order to encourage the intellectual and personal growth that comes from cultural immersion; to offer an opportunity to strengthen acquisition of the Spanish language; and to foster knowledge and appreciation of Spanish culture through studies in the humanities, social sciences, and fine arts. Academic study in the PRESHCO program is centered around a variety of courses specially developed for students in American colleges and universities and is taught by

regular faculty of the University of Córdoba. Classes, taught entirely in Spanish, are held in the University's Facultad de Filosofía y Letras, an eighteenth-century landmark building located in the heart of the medieval quarter. Course offerings are extensive, from more general survey-type courses on Spain and the European community, to specialized offerings on such topics as Roman Andalusia and Semitic Cultures in Al-Andalus. In addition, PRESHCO students may take selected courses in the regular offerings of the Facultad de Filosofía y Letras of the University of Córdoba. All books required for courses are included. Students also enjoy offerings in studio art, dance, and Spanish cooking.

Students are housed in a variety of arrangements, including homestay, privately run dormitories, and managed apartments. Meals and laundry services or facilities are included in each of these options. Extensive excursions complement and enhance the program of study. As part of the fall semester orientation, students take part in a tour through Spain that includes visits to Barcelona, Bilbao, Burgos, Salamanca, Avila, Madrid, Toledo, Segovia, and El Escorial. Visits to sites in Andalucía, including Seville and Granada, are also included during the fall. The spring semester includes excursions to Madrid, Toledo, Segovia, El Escorial, Cuenca, Mérida, Cáceres, Trujillo, Seville, and Granada. Round-trip airfare from three U.S. gateway cities is included in the comprehensive fee.

Date: Fall semester, spring semester, or entire academic year.

Application procedure: Application deadline for the spring 2002 semester is Monday, October 15, 2001. Application deadline for academic-year program for 2002-03 is Friday, March 15, 2002. Deadline for the fall 2002 semester is Friday, March 15, 2002.

Eligibility: Wellesley College (or consortium) student, prior course work or knowledge of Spanish, equivalent of five semesters of college work, strong academic record, and personal maturity and interest in the Hispanic world.

Cost: The cost of this program is Wellesley College tuition, fees, and room and board. Wellesley College financial aid transfers to this program.

St. Peter's College - Oxford University

Description: Wellesley College has a special arrangement with St. Peter's College at Oxford University whereby St. Peter's reserves several spaces each year for Wellesley students. Students are selected by the Wellesley College International Study Committee.

Date: Late September to late June with long vacations between semesters.

Application procedure: Students should submit applications to the Wellesley College International Studies Office by December 3, 2001, at noon. Selection of candidates occurs in December.

Eligibility: The program is highly selective. A GPA of 3.6 is average.

Cost: The cost of the program is slightly less than the cost of Wellesley College tuition. Wellesley College financial aid transfers to this program.

University of San Andres - Buenos Aires, Argentina

Description: Wellesley College operates a student-for-student exchange program with the Universidad de San Andres in Buenos Aires, Argentina. The university is a small, modern university located in the town of Victoria on the shores of the Rio de la Plata. Classes are normally conducted in Spanish, although professors, staff, and students have an excellent command of English. Students may attend for a semester or a year. The Foreign Student Office at the university arranges housing with an Argentine family and organizes trips and programs around Argentina. Students are enrolled in four courses per semester.

Date: Fall semester runs from the beginning of March to the first week of July; spring semester runs from the beginning of August to the first week of December. Students should arrive two weeks earlier than the above dates for orientation to the university and to Argentina.

Application procedure: Deadline for applications is mid-December for the fall semester of the following year and October 15 for the spring semester of the current academic year.

Eligibility: Students must have a 3.0 GPA.

Cost: Wellesley College financial aid transfers to this program. Round-trip transportation costs are not included in the financial aid package and must be arranged by the participant.

Wellesley-in-Aix

Description: Wellesley-in-Aix offers an exciting and challenging course of study and an authentic experience of French life and culture. The program is open to women and men alike. Its modest size (30–35 participants) allows for close attention to individual interests and academic needs. Options include the full-year program and a spring-semester program. Students begin with a pre-session of preparatory course work and cultural excursions in Paris. In Aix students are fully matriculated at the University of Provence (Aix-Marseille) and take the same courses as French students. Students are housed with selected families or share studio apartments in the centre ville.

Date: Full-year program is from August to June of the following year. The spring-semester program is from January to June.

Application procedure: Full-year program applications are due by March 1. Spring-semester program applications are due by October 8.

Eligibility: This is a junior-year abroad program.

Cost: The fee for the full-year program in 2002–03 is not yet set. The 2002 spring-semester program fee will be \$15,500. Wellesley College financial aid transfers to this program.

Wellesley-in-Mexico

Program: Fall-semester international study program in Oaxaca, Mexico. Courses include intensive Spanish language and a variety of other courses: History of Mexico, Archaeology, Environment and Development, Politics in Mexico, Medical Anthropology, and Mexican Literature.

Date: The program is held from August to December of each year.

Application procedure: Apply to the Wellesley-in-Mexico program through the International Studies Office and to the Wellesley-in-Mexico directors.

Eligibility: Students need appropriate level of Spanish language preparation for the program.

Cost: For the 2001 fall semester, tuition was \$13,100, which included full-semester tuition, room and board, and one round-trip ticket. Wellesley College financial aid transfers to this program.

Wellesley-in-Vienna

Program: The Department of German sponsors a junior-year abroad program in Vienna, Austria. The program offers both full-year and spring-semester options that allow students of almost any major to pursue their academic interests. An on-site resident director helps students with integration into university life. Founded in 1365, the University of Vienna is the oldest university in a German-speaking country and enrolls students in more than 180 departments and programs.

The opportunity to participate in internships at various political, cultural, and social institutions is a feature of the program. Internship stipends are made available by the Susan Rappaport Knafel '52 International Internship Fund with application through the Center for Work and Service.

Application procedure: Applications are due in mid-November of each academic year, with a second round of applications (for spring semester only) due in early February. Specific due dates for 2001–02 will be listed on the Web site by mid-October.

Eligibility: Open to Wellesley College students. Applicants should have completed at least four semesters of college-level German or its equivalent.

Cost: The cost of the program is determined each year. Costs for Wellesley-in-Vienna for 2001–02 are as follows: Full-year program: \$24,610 (\$14,500 tuition plus estimated individual student expenses, such as room and board and airfare of \$10,110).

Spring-semester program: \$12,785 (\$7,250 tuition plus estimated individual student expenses of \$5,535). Total cost figures are used as the basis for financial aid awards. There are financial penalties for withdrawal from the programs after confirmation of acceptance. Wellesley College financial aid transfers to this program.

Wellesley's Exchange with the Universities of Lancaster and Manchester (United Kingdom)

Description: Wellesley has a full-year and spring-semester exchange program in the UK with University of Manchester and the University of Lancaster. Applicants in good standing will be selected by lottery but must have a minimum 3.0 GPA. Two to four places will be available at each institution each year, depending on the number of students from the United Kingdom who apply to attend Wellesley.

Dates for the University of Lancaster: The full-year program is held from September to late June, with long vacations between terms. The spring-semester program is held from January to late June. During the spring semester, students will be attending terms 2 and 3.

Dates for the University of Manchester: The full-year program is held from September to late June, with long vacations between terms. The spring-semester program is held from late January to early June. During the spring semester, students will be attending the second semester.

Application procedure: Deadline for applications is mid-December, before winter break. Students chosen for the exchange will be notified early in February. Final acceptance decisions will be made by the host institutions.

Eligibility: This is a junior-year abroad program. Applicants must have a 3.0 GPA.

Cost: Wellesley students will pay Wellesley College for tuition, room and board, and all college fees. Health insurance will be covered by the National Health Service while students are in the United Kingdom. Wellesley College financial aid transfers to this program. Round-trip transportation costs are not included in the financial aid package and must be arranged by the student.

INTERNSHIP PROGRAMS

Center for Work and Service

The Center for Work and Service (CWS) Stipend Program is open primarily to first years, sophomores, and juniors (seniors are eligible for the Barbara Bush and Oprah Winfrey awards only). Information meetings for most stipends are held beginning in late November or early December when applications become available. Priority is given to students who state financial need and who have not previously received a stipend. Summer internships require 350 hours of work. Award decisions are merit-based and committees are not required to disburse all available funds.

Carolyn Shaw Bell Internship

Purpose: To encourage and support juniors seeking a summer internship experience in business or economics. This program provides stipends for internships within nonprofit or for-profit organizations.

Award: Up to five awards of \$4,000 each.

Applications: Available as of November 1, 2001 on the Center for Work and Service Web site.

Finally, given the main focus of the C-CLAK, which is to help both the people of Haiti and its visitors, students are welcome to use some of their skills in service work (English lessons, computer tutorials, music lessons, singing sessions with the children of the Center's kindergarten, and even helping to paint some sections of the building that houses the C-CLAK). Appropriate readings and a short paper on a practical topic are expected.

Application procedure: Applications are available in September either electronically or can be picked up at the Office of Religious and Spiritual Life.

Stipend: Limited scholarship funds are available for Peace and Justice Studies students.
