Rosi left her birthplace of Havana on a student visa at the age of 12 to attend the Foxcroft School in Middleburg, VA. It was at Foxcroft that she first met our classmate Mimi Woodville Snyder who remembers her for her keen intelligence and personality. Her younger sister, Eugenia (Genie) later followed her to Foxcroft.

Rosi was 16 when she joined our class as a freshman and 18 when she left Wellesley to marry Jorge Arguelles on July 3, 1965 in Miami. With him, she raised three daughters who remember her as “a wonderful, devoted mother; she was extremely intelligent and loved to read, two books a day. She wanted the best of everything for us and would do anything for us.” Her first passion was her family and she worked for a time in real estate. She enjoyed a happy and strong marriage for 34 years until her death of lung cancer on July 24, 2000 at the age of 53. She is survived by her husband Jorge, three daughters and five grandchildren.

Kathy will be remembered for her great love of animals, large and small. Even as a preteen, she was an accomplished rider.

An astute businesswoman, Kathy began a successful career in real estate in Beverly Hills in 1976 when her daughter Tiffany was 4. Ultimately she owned the local real estate office, Stage Stop Rand and Land Co, in Caliente, but her true passion was Tiffany Ranch Arabians in Piute Springs, Caliente, California.

Tiffany Ranch is a thriving Arabian stallion ranch, with a constant barrage of clients. Armed with a phone, a fax and a computer in an office the doubles as the bedroom and living room, where the front door opens into the barn, Katherine McWilliams lives out her childhood dream. McWilliams and her breeding manager and partner, Tom Smith [later, husband], run Tiffany Ranch, where they've lived for about five years. They


have about 30 horses on the property most weeks, but the heart of the business is the two stallions, Fire An Ice and Silverado Bey.

This small business was honored in May by the Weill Institute Small Business Development Center for its uniqueness and its ingenuity for high-tech marketing, combining the most basic of organic acts, reproduction, with advanced methods of commerce. McWilliams and Smith handle all aspects of the business, from collecting and shipping the semen to marketing the stallions and their offspring. The key to Tiffany Ranch, McWilliams said, is the right stallions, the right training and the right business approach. Smith handles the breeding and training of the stallions.

McWilliams is the marketing whiz. She created a Web site and marketing video for the stallions. Fire An Ice's semen had been sold to about 240 mare owners, many of whom have bred several mares. Before she began to raise stallions for breeding, McWilliams researched bloodlines and examined different stallions and mares for a gene pool that would be successful. Silverado Bey, 11, and Fire An Ice, 9, are now enjoying growing popularity. McWilliams attributes this to their calm personalities and their versatility as show horses, endurance sires or as the family pet.

Fire An Ice, in particular, has garnered a following. "I get emails from little girls who have Fire An Ice's picture on their walls" McWilliams said. The stallions' stud fees range between \$1500 and \$2000, and the total cost can reach \$2500. Arabian foals sell for \$15,000-\$20,000, according to McWilliams.


She will be missed for her winsome smile, energy and zest for life, and her deep dedication to family, friends and animals.

SHIRLEY ADAMS HARRINGTON

January 12, 1925 – April 14, 1995
 B.S. Chemistry, Emmanuel College 1946
 Masters in Chemistry, Wellesley College 1967

Shirley Adams was one of seven older college graduates who obtained a Masters in Chemistry from Wellesley College in 1967 under a NSF sponsored program. Her 1946 graduation profile from Emmanuel College reflects the respectful admiration of her classmates. From 1964 – 1967 she commuted to Wellesley from Lexington where she and her husband Charles Harrington raised their eight children. After Wellesley, she pursued chemical research at the U.S. Customs Laboratory in the World Trade Center, contributing to the development of a computerized “method... convenient for measuring a variety of samples containing high concentrations of morphine, heroin and cocaine with a single chromatographic system including automatic sampler and data system for continuous, unattended operation”. For her role in facilitating the DEA’s analysis of substantial seizures, she received an award from the Department of the Treasury in 1977.

In a Boston Herald feature on February 1, 1966 “Wellesley College Updates Distaff Chemists: Busy Moms Divide Time Between Lab and Nursery”, Shirley Harrington is pictured studying chemistry, while supervising homework for her eight children then ranging in age from 15 to 1-1/2.

Mrs. Harrington was a devout Catholic committed to action. After retiring to Palm Beach, she directed her energies to the Diocese’ Campaign for Human Development, dedicated to providing resources to organizations empowering the poor to seek greater justice. She served in leadership of the St. Jude Middle Income Process group in Boca Raton and taught ESL to children and adults in the migrant community up until the time of her death at age 70.

Busy Moms Divide Time Between Lab and Nursery

What does a woman with eight growing children do in her spare time?

If she has the initiative of Mrs. Shirley Harrington of Winchester, she takes a difficult master's degree in chemistry at nearby Wellesley College. This busy mother finds she can study only from a chemistry class while supervising her youngsters' homework sessions, and divide her time between the lab and the nursery.

Mrs. Harrington is one of 28 women enrolled in the pilot group of the Wellesley College Institute in Chemistry, a program designed to update knowledge in the field of chemistry in preparation for part of full-time work.

In cooperation with the National Science Foundation, Wellesley is offering the two-year, M.A. program to area women who graduated from college more than five years ago with a major or minor in chemistry. The women in the institute this year, both first and second-year students range from 28 to 64 years of age, and are graduates of 18 different colleges and universities. All but one are married.

A second-year student, Mrs. Hollisbea Bates of Watford teaches a freshman lab and still finds time to sit with her husband and three children on the weekends she plans to teach after getting the master's.

A new addition to the family was the reason Mrs. Jean Holmbeck of Sherborn joined the program. "The new baby forced me to quit my job at Monsanto Research Corporation in Woburn," said Mrs. Holmbeck.

MISS ELIZABETH GILES TO BE VASSAR GRADUATE

Miss Elizabeth Giles, daughter of Mrs. William Childs of 19 SE 11th Ave., is a member of the senior class at Vassar College which will be graduated on Sunday. Miss Giles majored in chemistry in preparation for postgraduate work in medicine and was named to the academic honor list in her first year at Vassar.

This year's graduating class of about 250 has finished the course for the A. B. degree in three years under the plan put into effect at Vassar in 1943 to train women more quickly for war work. As the three-year plan was adopted after the first year of this class, most of its members have done summer work at other institutions in order to complete the requirements for the degree. The plan is to be carried on until at least 1948 to determine its value for postwar education.

The commencement program has been planned in compliance with the request of the Office of Defense Transportation that traveling be discouraged at this time, and no formal invitations have been issued. Only three events are included, the senior dinner on Friday, (June 29), a class day entertainment on Saturday evening (June 30), and the commencement exercises in the Chapel on Sunday morning (July 1).

Asbury Park, NJ newspaper: In July, 1942, while Ibby was preparing to enter Vassar that fall, she was one of the "Misses" who were "junior hostesses" to more than 100 soldiers from Fort Monmouth and Camp Edison at a buffet supper dance in Spring Lake, NJ.

Fort Lauderdale, FL newspaper: In June, 1945, Ibby graduated from Vassar under an accelerated 3-year program initiated in 1943 to prepare women more quickly for war work; she planned to continue post graduate work in medicine. At the request of the Office of Defense Transportation however, no invitations were issued for graduation events, as traveling was discouraged at this point in the war.
