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THE DAVIS MUSEUM AT WELLESLEY COLLEGE CELEBRATES 25 YEAR ANNIVERSARY WITH FREE ARCHITECTURAL TOURS OF BUILDING



WELLESLEY, Mass. – The Davis Museum at Wellesley College is celebrating its 25th anniversary with architectural tours for the campus community and the public. On October 21, 1993, the Davis Museum hosted a dedication ceremony for the new four-story, 61,000 square foot building designed by Spanish architect José Rafael Moneo. The Museum opened with four floors and eleven galleries of works of art on view, study rooms for the students, a 167-seat cinema, and a café.

"Since the Davis opened its door in 1993, the encyclopedic

collection has grown from 5,000 to 13,000 objects with areas of strength in painting, sculpture, works on paper, photography, and decorative objects, from antiquity to the present day," said Lisa Fischman, Ruth Gordon Shapiro '37 Director of the Davis Museum. "In addition, the collection has become accessible worldwide through the online collections site, the mobile app, and third-party repositories Google Cultural Institute and Artsy. We will continue to work on new ways to engage our local community, as well as students, scholars, and art lovers around the world."

The Davis Museum is the fourth home to the collection on campus. The Wellesley art collection, initiated by Henry Fowle Durant and Pauline Durant with the founding of the College in 1875, was originally displayed in great College Hall, the primary residential and classroom building. It was later housed in the Farnsworth Art Building, founded in 1889, and then in Paul Rudolph's 1958 Jewett Arts Center, a masterpiece of mid-century Modern architecture.

In 1993, the Davis Museum opened its doors and soon after, the building's designer, Rafael Moneo, was awarded the Pritzker Architecture Prize. This facility, Moneo's first North American commission, immediately distinguished the Davis among its academic museum peers, and among the art museums and cultural institutions of the Greater Boston area. The building also rearticulated and revitalized the longstanding commitment to the central role of the visual arts in undergraduate liberal arts education at Wellesley College.

After completing the design of the Davis Museum, Rafael Moneo commented, "The artworks in the collection are like memories of those alumnae who lived here and who thought there could be no better place than Wellesley to which to leave the objects they loved so much. Therefore, I very much wanted the Museum to be understood as a treasury, a treasury that speaks about the lives of those people who received their education here."
