WELLESLEY, Mass. – Boston-based artist Ria Brodell has captured the attention of critics and media nationally and locally with the <u>Butch Heroes</u> series, which have been recently acquired by, and are on view at the Davis Museum at Wellesley College. These meticulously researched and beautifully rendered historical paintings depict transgender individuals throughout history. In these small portraits, Brodell addresses issues of gender, sexuality, and spirituality across centuries and geography through the depiction of queer individuals about whom generally little is known. The Davis Museum is pleased to announce the availability of a limited-edition boxed set of cards reflecting *Butch Heroes* at the Museum shop. The sets, which have been printed in a small edition of 150, feature 14 reproductions from Brodell's *Butch Heroes* series of original gouache paintings. Each

includes a biography and bibliography, thoroughly researched and compiled by the artist. In addition, the set features a special gold printed edition card, hand signed and numbered by the artist, and an informational insert on the project. The limited-edition boxed sets are available for \$240. Single, unsigned prints from the series, packaged with an informational insert card inside a specialty vellum envelope, are available for \$25.



Proceeds from sales of the Brodell editions support an acquisitions fund for works by or about the LGBTQI community. The Davis is committed to fostering an inclusive collection and environment, and standing as a leader among museums for enhancing accessibility, diversity, equity, and excellence. The Davis famously created the *Art-Less* exhibition last year demonstrating the critical role that immigrants to the United States have played in the arts, both in their creative contributions as well as in their stewardship of the visual arts. A companion t-shirt was created for the *Art-Less* initiative with proceeds from those sales contributing toward a fund to acquire art made by immigrants. The Brodell editions are another example of the Davis Museum's commitment to creating deliberately inclusive programs that are welcoming for all.
