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THE DAVIS MUSEUM HOSTS FOURTH ANNUAL OUTDOOR SUMMER FILM SERIES Family Friendly Films and Activities Explore Futuristic Technology



WELLESLEY, Mass. – This summer, the Davis Museum at Wellesley College will host its fourth-annual outdoor summer <u>film series</u>. In preparation for the Museum's fall's major exhibition *Fatimah Tuggar: Home's Horizons*, this year's theme explores futuristic technology.

The free screenings will take place during every other Thursday beginning on Thursday, June 27, and concluding on Thursday, August 8. The Davis Museum will also host its second-annual *Free Fun Fridays* event on Friday, August 9, an annual statewide cultural event hosted by the <u>Highland Street Foundation</u>.

"The film series is the perfect time for our local community, both on campus and beyond, to enjoy the vitality of the Davis during the summer months," said Arthurina Fears, Manager of Museum Education and Programs. "Visitors will find fun connections between technology and art through the films, gallery tours, and art-making activities."

The films will be projected on a screen on the Davis Museum plaza. Visitors are welcome to arrive as early as 7 p.m. for tours of the permanent collection inside the Davis and art-making activities for all ages on the Davis Plaza, and get settled into their viewing spot before the movie begins at sundown. At all screenings, there will be free popcorn, as well as beer for adults.

Descriptions of the movies featured in the Summer Film Series 2019 are below:



June 27: A Wrinkle in Time (2018)

Based on the timeless classic and filled with spectacle, warmth and heart, this celebrated film follows an ordinary girl's epic adventure and brave journey to save her family, with the ultimate triumph of love.

July 11: Back to the Future (1985)

When teenager Marty McFly is blasted to 1955 in the DeLorean time machine created by the eccentric Doc Brown, he finds himself mixed up in a time-altering chain reaction that could vaporize his future — and leave him trapped in the past.



July 25: WALL-E

After hundreds of lonely years of doing what he was built for, the curious and lovable WALL-E discovers a new purpose in life when he meets a sleek search robot named EVE.



August 8: The Fifth Element

In this outrageous sci-fi adventure, a New York cab driver unexpectedly becomes a hero in an extravagantly-styled tale of good against evil set in an unbelievable twenty-third century world.
