This year Sheffield Chamber Players return with a program juxtaposing a string trio by the grandfather of the 19th century Ukrainian compositional school, Mykola Lysenko, and a string quartet by one of the most important Russian composers of the 20th century, Dmitry Shostakovich. Lysenko's spirited romanticism and assertive Ukrainianism, combined with Shostakovich's powerful tribute to the loss of a friend, and perhaps to his own mortality, gain a new dimension in the context of current events.



The performance of each of the pieces will be preceded by a discussion. Q&A session with the audience will conclude the event.
